RIO DELL CITY COUNCIL REGULAR MEETING AUGUST 7, 2018 MINUTES

Mayor Wilson called the regular meeting of the Rio Dell City Council to order at 6:00 p.m.

The Council recessed into closed session at 6:00 p.m. with City Manager Knopp and City Attorney Gans to discuss the above matters.

The Council reconvened into open session at 6:30 p.m. Mayor Wilson announced that there was no reportable action taken in closed session.

PUBLIC PRESENTATIONS

Nick Angeloff provided an update on recent Chamber of Commerce business and gave a brief recap of Wildwood Days activities. He noted that the theme for this years' parade was "Lest We Forget" in honor of the 100th Anniversary of WWI Armistice. He said the festivities included a tree dedication to veterans which took place at Memorial Park (No. 17 in the State) and thanked Mayor Wilson for his participation in the event. In moving forward, he announced once again that the Chamber would be selling stars to businesses for \$250.000 each to increase the Christmas display of lights and decorations in town. He said they are also looking for support to purchase some veteran's flags.

Councilmember Garnes thanked the Chamber of Commerce and the Fire Department for putting together another great Wildwood Days Event and to everyone who made it possible to get the Eagle Prairie Bridge open for the weekend's festivities.

Julie Woodall stated that she attended a great event at the Fire Hall put on for kids with autism, and said kids were able to interact with firefighters in a non-emergency situation. She also commended Chief Conner and his officers for their involvement during the Wildwood Day's activities and said it was nice to see the Chief around town on his bike during the events. She added that it was amazing to see how much the Fire Department was able to pull things together in preparation for the event.

Jerry Jackson, 180 Third Ave. addressed the Council regarding the parking problem on the avenues and said he was working with the Chief on his problem but there are still a lot of problems existing. He commended the Chief for doing a good job and for being approachable. He encouraged the City Council to continue to address the ongoing parking problems.

CONSENT CALENDAR

Mayor Wilson removed consent calendar items 3 and 4 for separate discussion. Julie Woodall asked that item 5 be removed to allow for public comment on the item. City Manager Knopp announced that staff was actually going to request that the item be removed from the agenda due to new developments regarding code enforcement services.

Motion was made by Johnson/Garnes to approve the remaining consent calendar items including approval of minutes of the July 17, 2018 regular meeting; and to receive and file Measure Z 4th Quarter Report. Motion carried 5-0.

ITEMS REMOVED FROM THE CONSENT CALENDAR

Authorize the Mayor to Sign a Letter Opposing AB 2681, Seismic Resiliency

Mayor Wilson explained that the State wants to impose greater restrictions on seismic resiliency efforts and AB 2681 would establish a statewide mandate requiring Building Departments to create an inventory of potentially vulnerable buildings within its jurisdiction. The proposed bill does not take into consideration the effect it would have on local jurisdictions or provide any funding for local governments. As such, he supports staff's recommendation to send a letter opposing AB 2681. He said he wanted citizens to be aware that the bill has passed the House and is going to the Senate for possible approval.

Motion was made by Wilson/Johnson to authorize the Mayor to sign a letter opposing AB 2681. Motion carried 5-0.

Approve Employment Agreement for Wastewater Superintendent and Authorize the City Manager to Sign

Mayor Wilson formally recognized Ethan Purvis, the current Wastewater Superintendent Trainee who successfully fulfilled the requirements of his position for promotion to Wastewater Superintendent. He commented that he is an excellent addition to the current staff and extended his thanks and appreciation.

Motion was made by Wilson/Johnson to approve the Employment Agreement for Wastewater Superintendent Ethan Purvis and authorize the City Manager to sign. Motion carried 5-0.

REPORTS/STAFF COMMUNICATIONS

City Manager/Staff Update

City Manager Knopp referred to the staff update provided in the Council packet and informed the Council that over the past two weeks, employment offers were extended to four individuals; three in the Public Works Department and one in the Finance Department. He commented that staff was available to answer any questions regarding the staff update.

Councilmember Strahan asked for an update on the proposed wind energy project.

City Manager Knopp said that he attended an open house at the Veteran's Memorial Building in Fortuna on July 25, 2018 regarding the Terra-Gen wind energy project and said the project is in its early stages. He noted that they are using state-of-the-art technology in analyzing potential environmental effects of the project. Terra-Gen representatives will be present at the August 21, 2018 City Council meeting to provide an overview of the project and answer questions. He explained that the equipment will be coming in from Jordan Creek area so the impact to Rio Dell will be very low although there will be some visual impact.

Community Development Director Caldwell noted that there would be another public meeting on August 15, 2018 at the Winema Theater in Scotia and that he would verify the time and let Councilmembers know.

Mayor Pro Tem Johnson asked the City Clerk how many City Council candidates had submitted their nomination papers. City Clerk Dunham responded that only one candidate had submitted as of today.

Mayor Wilson said as mentioned in the staff update, he and the City Manager met with Allison Talbot from PG&E regarding inverse condemnation and AB 33. He explained that what that means is that PG&E is ultimately responsible for any fires that occur under their power lines. They are trying to change that so they are only responsible for fires they actually cause. He pointed out that the costs related to these damages could be passed onto the ratepayers. He said there is another legislative bill moving forward regarding issuance of bonds.

SPECIAL PRESENTATIONS/STUDY SESSIONS

Presentation – Rio Dell Library Project Update

City Manager Knopp provided a summary of the staff report and said in 2016 the County entered into a consent decree with the Department of Justice (DOJ) which mandates the County to comply and modify facilities, where feasible, to ensure that programs, services and activities are accessible to and useable by individuals with disabilities. He noted that the library

building is owned by the Fire District but leased by the County. Although the library building was not explicitly mentioned in the consent decree, it stated that the County must be in compliance with all of the County's facilities offering programs or services. The County hired an Independent Licensed Architect who went to various locations throughout the County to conduct assessments, including Rio Dell. The Rio Dell Library was one of the facilities identified to have access barriers including a non-compliant ADA parking space. In addition to the facility, they also evaluated the nearest path of travel between the library and the bus stop. The cost to bring those three deficiencies up to current ADA code was estimated at \$248,365.

He noted that ADA compliance of the library building and parking lot is the responsibility of the Fire District and the sidewalks and bus stop facilities are the responsibility of the City.

Staff explained that the County is required to submit a report to DOJ by September 7th including a transition plan for coming into compliance with the consent decree. He continued with review of potential solutions which included:

- 1. The County of Humboldt to identify the Fortuna Library as the designated disability access facility for the region on an ongoing basis. (the building would still need to meet ADA requirements).
- 2. The Rio Dell Fire District brings the library building up to ADA code with the City developing a transition plan to update the path of travel to the bus stop.
- 3. The Rio Dell Fire District transferring ownership of the library building and property to the City. The idea is that the City may be in a better position to leverage grant dollars to bring the facility up to ADA code.
- 4. Negotiate with DANCO to incorporate space within their proposed development on Rigby Ave. thus alleviating ADA access concerns.

City Manager Knopp commented that from the City's perspective, staff should be as constructive as possible to keep the library within the City. Staff's recommendation is to authorize the Mayor to sign a letter stating the City's interest in keeping the library in Rio Dell and endorsing the exploration of the options as stated as a preliminary transition plan. He noted that the Fire District and DANCO would also need to provide letters to the County to be included in their report to DOJ to help provide time for all parties to explore potential solutions.

Mayor Wilson invited public comment on the matter.

Jim Barsanti, Rio Dell Fire Commissioner commented that the Fire Commissioners would discuss the issue at their next meeting on August 9, 2018 but made it clear that the Fire District does not have the funds to do the repairs to bring the library building into ADA compliance. He seemed to be receptive to the idea of relocating the library to the DANCO site provided an agreement could be worked out with them.

Joe Timmerman spoke on behalf of the Fire District and indicated that he had been involved with the ADA issues for the past five years and during that time; the Fire District had people out

to access the ADA deficiencies. He said that he cannot speak for the Fire Commissioners but would be willing to keep the library open provided there is a transition plan in place. He pointed out that just to bring the outside into compliance is over \$120,000 and reiterated what Jim Barsanti said in that the Fire District simply does not have the funds to bring the facility into ADA compliance.

Councilmember Strahan asked for the history of the library and recalled a mobile unit that used to come down.

Joe Timmerman confirmed that there was a mobile unit that came to Rio Dell and could possibly still come although there are many elderly people that use the library and access may be a problem for them.

Mayor Wilson questioned the possibility of keeping the Rio Dell library open and utilizing Fortuna as the ADA accessible library.

City Manager Knopp noted that the City would still be discriminating against people with disabilities and said the building is a public facility and needs to be ADA compliant no matter what its use is. He said if there is a transition plan in place, it buys time with DOJ. He said the letter expressing support for potential solutions to address the problem along with a copy of the minutes from this meeting showing community support would be forwarded to the County for inclusion in the County's report to DOJ.

Councilmember Garnes asked if the issue regarding the path of travel from the library to the bus stop would be agenized later.

City Manager Knopp explained that the item would come back to the Council to discuss a transition plan for the path of travel improvements if necessary. He explained that because the City has less than 50 employees, it fits in a different classification but the City would need to catalog the deficiencies and come up with a transition plan to address them. He noted that the City was pro-active in addressing the City Hall porch upgrade but there are other ADA issues with City Hall that need to be addressed. He added that the repairs will come under immense scrutiny by DOJ and the project will require construction management and the use of a CASP specialist, which will add to the construction costs.

Councilmember Strahan asked if DANCO and the County are in agreement with the plan.

City Manager Knopp responded that they were in tentative agreement but there is no guarantee.

Nick Angeloff asked if Rio Dell is being slighted by, the County in a sense that they are willing to make sure the Fortuna library is ADA compliant but not concerned about Rio Dell. He

expressed the need to keep the library open and as Chamber of Commerce president, offered to talk to Supervisor Fennell or do anything else he could to help.

Councilmember Marks asked if the Fire District has access to grant dollars to initiate the repairs.

City Manager Knopp was not aware of any potential grant funding and noted that the Fire District has a pretty specific revenue source. He commented that the City has access to possible grants that the Fire District does not have access to such as CDBG and Park Bond Grants.

Community Development Director pointed out that the City would have to own the facility to access CDBG monies to do the repairs.

Motion was made by Johnson/Garnes to authorize the Mayor to sign the letter outlining the City position on the Rio Dell library and send it to the County for inclusion in their report to DOJ. Motion carried 5-0.

Presentation - DANCO Project Update

City Manager Knopp introduced Chris Dart from DANCO who was present to discuss a proposal for a low-income housing project on the corner of Center St. and Rigby Ave.

Chris Dart provided a power point presentation and explained the proposed project, Rio Dell Permanent Supportive Housing, would include 26 Cottage style residential units with a manager's unit and common structures and open areas leading to private open areas and entrances to each single story unit. He said that there would be 22 one-bedroom units and four (4) two-bedroom units; one of which would be reserved for the on-site manager.

He said in addition to the residential units, the project would include a Main Common Building at over 2,000 square feet and contain support facilities such as a residential-style common kitchen for group meetings, an exercise room, office space for the office manager, resident services coordination, a room for the case manager, individual counseling rooms, and a bedbug decontamination room. He said there would also be space for outdoor activities including a full-size basketball court.

He mentioned the recent discussions with the City regarding possible incorporation of the public library as well as space for the Community Resource Center and said they are receptive to the idea but there is a lot to work out including reconfiguration of the site plan. Upon preliminary review of the concept, the State indicated that the library could be incorporated into the project but they would not be funding it. He said they are utilizing permanent funds, PHC and tax credits to fund the project and if the additional costs are too large they may have to go out for additional funding. He noted that with many of the residents in need of special needs assistance, having the Community Resource Center on-site would be a great idea.

He continued with a review of the construction timeline and noted that if they were awarded in September for that round of tax credits, they would only have 180 days in which to pull the necessary permits. He said that with the permits secured in February 2019, construction would be completed by the end of 2019.

He concluded the presentation by stating that the project would provide permanent supportive housing for low-income residents and would be a well-run program with on-site management, Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) case workers, counseling services, and onsite security. He noted the project would be similar to the project they constructed on Smith Lane in Fortuna.

Mayor Pro Tem Johnson asked if they had any estimated construction costs for the library.

Chris Dart commented that construction costs are figured at \$250 square foot and the construction costs as presented is \$7.5 million. He felt confident they could find a way to incorporate square footage for the library.

Mayor Wilson invited questions or comments from the public.

Julie Woodall asked how many people would be allowed in each unit.

Chris said the one-bedroom units would be limited to no more than two people and the twobedroom units would be limited to no more than three people.

Nick Angeloff commented that he would like to see the library remain on Wildwood Ave. but if that were not an option, then incorporation of the library with the DANCO project would be a good alternative.

Discussion continued regarding the process in determining housing criteria.

Chris explained that the Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) handles the referrals.

Presentation - Active Transportation Plan (ATP) Project Mayor Wilson announced the removal of this item from the agenda.

ORDINANCES/SPECIAL RESOLUTIONS/PUBLIC HEARINGS

Introduction/First Reading (by title only) of Ordinance No. 370-2018 Approving Text Amendments Amending the Neighborhood Center (NC) and Community Commercial (CC) Zones, Sections 17.20.050 and 17.20.060 of the Rio Dell Municipal Code to allow residential uses on upper floors of mixed-use buildings

Community Development Director Caldwell provided a staff recommending approval of zoning

text amendments to allow residential uses on upper floors of mixed-use buildings in the Neighborhood Center (NC) and Community Commercial (CC) zones. In the process of updating the City's Housing Element, staff discovered policies and action plans that require the City to update the Zoning Regulations to allow residential uses on upper floors of mixed-use buildings. He noted that the Land Use Element identifies these as principally permitted uses and the amendment will make the Zoning Regulations consistent with the General Plan.

Mayor Wilson asked if any of these type buildings exist in the Community Commercial zone. Community Development Director Caldwell said that there is none currently but with this amendment, they would be allowed.

Councilmember Strahan asked if this zoning amendment would apply to the Humboldt Rio Dell Business Park parcels. Community Development Director Caldwell indicated that it would only apply to the Neighborhood Center (NC) and Community Commercial (CC) zones and not the Industrial Commercial (IC) zone.

Mayor Wilson opened the public hearing to receive public comments on the proposed ordinance. There being no public comment, the public hearing closed.

Motion was made by Johnson/Garnes to approve the introduction/first reading (by title only) of Ordinance No. 370-2018 Approving Test Amendments Amending the Neighborhood Center (NC) and Community Commercial (CC) Zones, Sections 17.20.050 and 17.20.060 of the Rio Dell Municipal Code to allow residential uses on upper floors of mixed-use buildings. Motion carried 5-0.

COUNCIL REPORTS/COMMUNICATIONS

Mayor Pro Tem Johnson announced that the League of California Cities Redwood Empire Division Quarterly meeting would be held in Eureka on August 17th. He encouraged members to attend and said that it is a great opportunity for councilmembers to see what the League does. He also announced that he would not be attending the August 21st regular meeting, as he would be out of state.

Mayor Wilson reported on his attendance at the August 1, 2018 Humboldt Waste Management Authority (HWMA) special meeting. He said the board authorized Recology Eel River to move forward with implementation of the new Recyclable Materials Processing fees and negotiations with member agencies to amend their respective franchise agreements to reflect the new cost to curbside collection customers. He explained the actual cost per ton of material is \$69.56 and the increases will be recovered through proposed amendments with increases in the affected franchise agreements. He commented that HWMA and Recology Eel River are still trying to find places to get rid of some plastics that are no longer recyclable. He emphasized that the world is changing globally in the area of recycling.

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Motion was made by Johnson/Wilson to adjourn the meeti 2018 regular meeting. Motion carried 5-0.	ng at 7:45 p.m. to the August 21,

Recommendation

Authorize the City Manager to execute a continued contract agreement with Adult Day Health & Alzheimer Services for transportation services for the fiscal year 2018-2019.

BACKGROUND AND DISCUSSION

The City of Rio Dell has contracted with Adult Day Health Services for many years to provide transportation services for residents of Rio Dell who are disabled and/or 55 years of age and older. The City receives Transportation Development Act (TDA) funding through the Humboldt County Association of Governments (HCAOG) for this purpose.

FISCAL IMPACT

The cost of the upcoming year's services is \$6,500. Funding for said services is provided through the cities TDA allocation and is currently included in the 2018-2019 operating budget.

CONTRACT AGREEMENT TRANSPORTATION SERVICES FOR THE ELDERLY AND FUNCTIONALLY DISABLED

This agreement made and entered into and made effective as of July 1, 2018, by and between the City of Rio Dell (hereinafter referred to as "City"), and Adult Day Health & Alzheimer Services, a private, non-profit organization (hereinafter referred to as "Provider"), for the period of July 1, 2018 to June 30, 2019, regarding provision of the following services:

Transportation for Adult Day Health & Alzheimer Services Program Participants

IT IS MUTUALLY AGREED by and between City and Provider as follows:

- 1. Provider shall perform, in a satisfactory and proper manner, transportation services between the City of Rio Dell and Adult Day Health & Alzheimer Services, to persons fifty-five (55) years of age and older and for disabled individuals.
- 2. City shall compensate Provider per ride, round trip, up to a total compensation of \$6,500.
- 3. Services will be available through the entire twelve (12) month period of contract.
- 4. Any changes in scope of service, including any increase or decrease in compensation which is agreed upon between the parties, shall be effective when incorporated in written amendments to the Agreement. No oral understanding or agreement shall be binding to the parties hereto.
- 5. Compensation shall be paid to Provider upon receipt of properly completed financial reports.

 Total annual compensation shall not exceed TDA funds requested and received by the City from HCAOG for this purpose.
- 6. Provider agrees to comply with all applicable federal, state, and local laws, regulations, standards, policies, and standards of employment, included but not limited to, California Transportation Development Act rules and regulations. Provider also agrees to keep in effect all licenses, permits, notices, certificates, bonds, and insurance required for performing the service.
- 7. During the terms of this Agreement, Provider shall insure Provider and, as an additional primary insured, shall insure City, its officials, officers, and employees against all damages and claims for damages for bodily injury or property damage arising out of this agreement or the use of any vehicle used to provide transportation hereunder and resulting from Provider's ownership, maintenance, or use of said vehicles, in the minimum amount of \$1,000,000 combined single limit. Approve the Scope of Services from Hamanaka Painting Co., INC, to Re-paint the Roberts Water Treatment Filter Units for the sum of \$15,392.26.

BUDGETARY IMPACT:

Water Capitol Funds Account Code 6500-14-062-0000-9019 with a budget of \$25,000.

BACKGROUND AND DISCUSSION

The City of Rio Dell uses the Roberts Filter Group Water Treatment System at 475 Hilltop Dr. for its primary water treatment system. This water treatment system was originally installed in 2001 and was upgraded in 2006 by the addition of two additional filters and the installation of the Infiltration Gallery along the Eel River. During this upgrade process, Filters #1 and #2 had been sandblasted and recoated due to factory coating failures. Since then, the refinished coatings have slowly degraded within the filters interior walls at the water level surface area as well as some small areas on the bottom exterior of the Filter units. Filters #3 and #4 will also have some touch up done at this time as well to remove any deficiencies with its current coatings. There will be some minor touchup on the Flocculation / Sedimentation Unit as well (aka Reliant). This recoating process is necessary to prolong the useful life of the filter units and to help prevent any future structural failures or damage.

BACKGROUND AND DISCUSSION

The Council is being asked to authorize the City Manager to make amendments to the agreements for the Rio Dell Employee's Association, Water and Streets Superintendent and Wastewater Superintendent positions to allow for the implementation of an alternative workweek schedule for a portion of the Public Works Department, primarily for the water and wastewater plant operators. This change will apply to five full time positions. This change does not apply to the utility crew, the field division of Public Works. The proposed changes are attached and would alter Section 17 of the current RDEA agreement and also create new sections for the employment agreements with the two superintendent positions.

ARTICLE 17: WORK SCHEDULE AND OVERTIME

A. CERTAIN PUBLIC WORKS POSITIONS

For employees holding the Job Title of Utility Worker I/II, Water/Wastewater Plant Operator I/II and Public Works Leadman, employees shall be scheduled to work not more than five days per "workweek," as that term is defined below, and not more than eight hours per day.

Overtime shall mean the time that an employee is required to work in excess of eight hours per day or forty hours per week. The workweek shall begin at 12:01 am on Saturday each week. Employees required to work more than eight hours per day or forty hours in a workweek shall be eligible for overtime pay at one and one-half time their regular rate of pay or compensatory time off at the option of the employee. Compensatory time shall accrue at the rate of time and one-half to a maximum amount not to exceed thirty-two (32) hours. In the event of an occurrence which required an extraordinary amount of overtime the City Manager can approve an increase in the maximum amount of compensatory time accrued and a reasonable extension of time in which to use it. An employee desiring to use earned compensation time off must first obtain department head approval, which will not be unreasonably withheld. Compensation time off-hours shall be paid to an employee upon separation from City service.

B. ALL OTHER NON-PUBLIC WORKSOTHER ASSOCIATION EMPLOYEES

For employees holding the job title of Accountant I/II, Administrative Assistant, Administrative Technician, Fiscal Assistant I/II, Office Assistant, Records Technician, and Senior Fiscal Assistant, Water/Wastewater Plant Operator I/II, and [INSERT ANY OTHERS], employees, shall be scheduled to work not more than four days per "workweek", as that term is defined above, and not more than ten hours per day. Each employee shall be regularly scheduled to work one of the following three schedules: Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday from 7:00a.m. to ___5:30p.m. or Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday from 7:00a.m. to _____5:30p.m. or Monday, Tuesday, Thursday, Friday from 7:00am to 5:30p.m. The City Manager shall determine which schedule will constitute each employee's regular schedule. Once determined, each employee's regular schedule shall not be altered except upon mutual agreement of the employee and the City Manager or upon the giving of one (1) week prior notice to the affected employee when the interests of the City so require. The City Manager, in his or her sole discretion, also may provide a work schedule not exceeding eight hours per day to accommodate any employee who is hired after the adoption of this MOU and who is unable to work any the schedule established herein. The City Manager will also explore any available reasonable alternative means of accommodating an employee's religious beliefs or observances that conflict with anthe workweek schedule, as required by law.

Overtime shall mean the time that an employee is required to work in excess of ten hours per day or forty hours per week. Employees required to work more than ten hours per day or forty hours in a workweek shall be eligible for overtime pay at one and one-half time their regular rate of pay or compensatory time off at the option of the employee. Compensatory time shall accrue at the rate of time and one-half to a maximum amount not to exceed thirty-two (32) hours. In the event of an occurrence which required an extraordinary amount of overtime the City Manager can approve an increase in the maximum amount of compensatory time accrued and a reasonable extension of time in which to use it. An employee desiring to use earned compensation time off must first obtain

During the period of August 1 to August 15, 2018, the Department opened only one new case dealing with abandoned or junk vehicles. During the same time period, the Department did not close any cases. This was partially due to Wildwood Days falling in this time period as well as multiple complex investigations. The next reporting period should see a return to more normal numbers.

During the period of August 1 to August 15, 2018, there were eight calls for service related to animal control issues. Two dogs were transported to Miranda's Rescue. One of these calls was for two dogs that had got on the freeway near Davis. They were located on the freeway in Scotia and taken into custody before either one was hit by a car although there were a couple of close calls. The dogs belonged to a family that had to relocate to Rio Dell due to the Carr Fire and their parent's property was not dog proof.

In the early morning hours of August 1, 2018, there were numerous thefts from unlocked vehicles along the Avenues and on Meadowbridge. In many cases, the items stolen included vehicle registrations and/or proofs of insurance. The thief was observed trying to open a car door on Edwards and was



chased down by a resident. The thief was able to escape before an officer arrived, but some of the stolen property was recovered.

On August 10, 2018, the Department served a search warrant at the old Eel River Sawmill office building. The owner had applied for a conditional use permit, but none of the conditions for the current cultivation had been met, including enrollment in the track and trace program. Consequently, any marijuana products produced would have had to enter the black market. The Department destroyed 581 flowering marijuana plants, 151 marijuana plants in a vegetative state, 818 drying marijuana plants and/or stalks, approximately ten pounds of dried marijuana trim material and about one pound of processed marijuana flowers.

While on patrol, Officer Carnahan spotted a man sitting in a car in an area where numerous reports of drug sales have been made. Officer Carnahan made a consensual contact with the man and learned that he was on probation. Officer Carnahan conducted a probation search and located a useable amount of heroin. This information will further the investigation into possible drug sales at the location and further enforcement action is anticipated.

The County of Humboldt (County) Planning & Building Department has received an application from Humboldt Wind, LLC (Applicant) for a conditional use permit (CUP) to construct and operate the Humboldt Wind Energy Project (Project), a wind energy generation facility in Humboldt County, California. The issuance of the CUP is a "project" as defined by the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) and subject to environmental review. PROJECT LOCATION AND SETTING


Figure 1. Project Vicinity

The Project traverses land bisected by U.S. Highway 101 (U.S. 101), roughly 12 miles southeast of the city of Fortuna and 20 miles north of the community of Garberville (Figure 1). The community of Scotia is located adjacent to the northern edge of the Project alignment.

Vegetation along the alignment is primarily evergreen woodlands and the topography is steep, with elevations ranging from nearly sea level to almost 3,100 feet above sea level. A portion of the area's woodland acreage is under timber production or subject to Williamson Act contracts. The alignment for the proposed general transmission line (Gen-Tie) for the Project would require crossing the Eel River (Figure 2a). Boring under the river is planned for this segment to reduce visibility and minimize potential impacts to marbled murrelet. The point of interconnection with Pacific Gas and Electric Company's (PG&E's) transmission grid would be the Bridgeville Substation (Figure 2b) through one of three optional routes under consideration.

LAND USE PLANS

The Humboldt County General Plan land use designations along the Project alignment consist primarily of Timberland, with Industrial, Agricultural Grazing, and Urban Development Area overlay where the Gen-Tie crosses U.S. 101.

Lands crossed by the Project are primarily zoned Agriculture Exclusive (AE) and Timber Production Zone (TPZ), except for limited intermittent segments of the Gen-Tie. The land is currently in timber production. Under the AE and TPZ designations, wind energy facilities require a CUP from the County. Constructing and operating electrical distribution and transmission lines are permitted uses in the TPZ;

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however, a CUP is required in the AE zone. Accordingly, the applicant is submitting a CUP application pursuant to County Code Section 3.1.2, which, if approved, would cover all Project related activities.


PROJECT DESCRIPTION

The Project would construct and operate 60 wind turbine generators (WTGs) and associated infrastructure with a nameplate generating capacity (i.e., theoretical maximum energy generation) of up to 155 megawatts (MW). In addition to the wind turbines and transformers, the Project would include ancillary facilities such as temporary staging areas, access roads, 34.5-kilovolt (kV) collection lines (collection system), an operations and maintenance (O&M) building, a substation with energy storage infrastructure, utility switchyard modification, and a 115-kV Gen-Tie.

Figure 2a and 2b shows the representative locations of Project infrastructure based on the information available at the time this NOP was released. The Applicant is conducting studies along the planned alignment to collect information regarding the resources present. Data gained from these studies will be used to inform the Project's design, with the intent of avoiding and minimizing environmental impacts. Therefore, the Project layout depicted in Figure 2a and 2b illustrates a development corridor within which Project infrastructure would be sited, and is subject to refinement.

The Project would include the following elements:

- up to 60 WTGs depicted in Figure 2a and 2b, ranging between 2.2 and 4.5 MW, erected on tubular steel towers set on concrete foundations, and associated turbine pads, temporary staging areas, and transformers:
- new roads, including temporary access roads required for construction and permanent service roads for O&M, and improvements to existing public roads to facilitate turbine delivery;
- a 115-kV Gen-Tie connecting the Project with the existing PG&E transmission system, with a below-surface crossing of the Eel River (Figure 2a);
- a substation to connect to the Gen-Tie:
- a collection system linking WTGs to each other and to the substation;
- a communication system (fiber optic cable) adjacent to the collection system;
- an O&M facility, including an operations building and an outdoor storage area;
- permanent meteorological towers;
- a 10-acre temporary staging area and a construction trailer and parking area located within the O&M facility; and
- three, 5-acre temporary staging areas distributed throughout the Project site, including as many as two, temporary cement batch plants operating at two of the three staging areas.

Portions of the collection system would be constructed within access roads; no additional permanent impacts would occur in these areas. Note that acreage includes collocated underground fiber-optic communications cable.

Construction Activity and Schedule

Construction would last between 16 and 18 months. The sequence of construction activities would generally be as follows: site preparation/grading, tree clearing, access road construction, turbine foundation construction, collection system installation, substation construction, Gen-Tie installation, switchyard installation, turbine installation, final testing and turbine commissioning, O&M facilities installation, and cleanup and restoration.

The project requires creation of a temporary staging area, construction trailer area, and associated parking area on an approximately 10-acre compacted gravel pad. During construction, the staging area would be used to store large equipment and materials, to refuel equipment, and to collect and temporarily store construction waste. It also would serve as a place to park vehicles, set a temporary mobile for use as construction office space, and temporary (portable) sanitary facilities. A vendor-supplied fuel truck that would make daily or weekly deliveries to fill approved storage tanks that would be used to refuel construction vehicles. Following construction, this area would become part of the Project's O&M facility (Figure 2a).

Three smaller staging areas would also be needed along the alignment. Each would consist of five acres that would be used to stage construction equipment, materials and contractor trailers (Figures 2a and 2b). The temporary staging areas would be cleared of vegetation, compacted to support construction equipment, and may be graveled depending on soil conditions.

The applicant is in the process of determining the point of delivery for the Project's wind turbines and related equipment. It is anticipated that equipment would be shipped to Field's Landing in Humboldt Bay, and would be delivered by truck via U.S. 101 to the temporary staging area(s) located near the Jordan Creek off-ramp (Figure 1). Upon arrival at the temporary staging area(s), the equipment either would be offloaded or stored, or would be hauled directly to the worksite and installed. Access roads would be used to transport equipment from the temporary staging area to the worksite.

To facilitate the delivery of Project components along the U.S. 101 corridor, modifications to existing roads may be required. Such modifications could include but would not be limited to creating temporary off-ramps to bypass portions of U.S. 101; temporarily relocating obstacles such as fences and street signs; temporarily relocating or extending overhead utility poles; and removing or pruning vegetation within existing road rights-of-way. If needed, Project-specific traffic controls would allow for equipment delivery while maintaining ingress and egress for emergency service providers. The Applicant is determining the scope of the temporary modifications and traffic controls and will submit a transportation plan to the County and the California Department of Transportation.

SUMMARY OF KEY ENVIRONMENTAL ISSUES TO BE ADDRESSED IN THE EIR

Pursuant to Section 15064 of the State CEQA Guidelines, the discussion of potential Project effects on the environment in the EIR will concentrate on those impacts that the County has determined may be potentially significant. The detailed analysis will evaluate the Project; however, the EIR will also describe a range of reasonable alternatives to the proposed Project that are capable of meeting most of the Project's objectives, and that would avoid or substantially lessen any of the significant effects of the Project, consistent with State CEQA Guidelines Section 15126.6. The EIR will also evaluate the cumulative impacts of the Project when considered in conjunction with other related past, present, and reasonably foreseeable future projects.

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The following topics will be evaluated in the EIR:

- Aesthetics—The EIR will characterize the visual setting through use of photographs and computer
 modeling. Through use of photo-realistic visual simulations, impacts of Project construction and
 operation on scenic resources and vistas will be described. Avoidance and mitigation measures
 would be imposed where significant impacts are identified.
- Agriculture and Forestry Resources—The EIR will evaluate the potential direct and indirect impacts to timberlands and land designated Agricultural Preserves that are subject to Williamson Act contracts.
- Air Quality—The Draft EIR will consider direct and indirect impacts to regional and local air quality
 because of project construction and operation. Emissions of criteria air pollutants will be estimated
 using computer models and methodology approved by the North Coast Unified Air Pollution Control
 District (NCUAPCD). Project consistency with adopted plans or policies intended to address air
 quality will be evaluated and avoidance measures identified.
- Biological Resources—The Project area is covered in managed forestlands, mixed with evergreen
 and deciduous forest types. Shrub/scrublands, annual grasslands, and developed roads make up the
 remaining land cover in the Project area. The EIR will characterize the existing resources found along
 the project alignment and analyze impacts of the proposed Project on these biological resources. No
 avoidance measures or permits have been identified at this time, but such measures may be included
 in the Project EIR.
- Cultural Resources—The EIR will identify and analyze impacts of the proposed Project on cultural
 and tribal cultural resources based on the findings of a Phase 1 cultural resources survey. In addition,
 consultation with representatives of the Yurok and Wiyot, Karok, Hoopa, Chilula, and Whilkut tribes,
 and other Native American tribe interests, may need to be conducted in compliance with Assembly
 Bill (AB) 52, which requires such consultation as part of a project's CEQA review.
- Geology and Soils—In general, the Project area is susceptible to ground shaking. Slope stability in
 the Project area ranges from moderate to highly unstable. The EIR will programmatically evaluate
 impacts from landsliding and unstable soils that could result from grading, roads, and new
 development. It is anticipated that site-specific geotechnical investigations would be conducted before
 construction.
- Greenhouse Gas Emissions—In the North Bay Air Basin, North Coast Unified Air Quality Management District (NCUAQMD) regulates greenhouse gas emissions through its Rule 111 (Federal Permitting Requirements for Sources of Greenhouse Gases). The EIR will evaluate the Project in terms of its consistency with Rule 111, California's Greenhouse Gas (GHG) reduction goals, recommendations contained in the AB 32 Scoping Plan, and other recent guidance documents regarding Project-generated GHG emissions. Avoidance measures or permits may be identified in the Project EIR.
- Hazardous and Hazardous Materials—The EIR will assess hazards and hazardous materials
 impacts from wind energy sites by considering storage, handling, and application practices of
 hazardous materials, and will review the hazards of permitting new and wind energy activities in

areas of wildland fire risk. The EIR will also analyze specific requirements for the Project based on the turbine heights. Site-specific aviation conditions will be developed in conjunction with the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA), and turbine lighting would be consistent with all FAA requirements.

- Hydrology and Water Quality—Rivers, creeks, and drainages within the Project boundaries could
 be subject to disturbance during construction. The EIR will identify and analyze impacts of the Project
 on hydrology and water quality in the area. Avoidance measures to minimize impacts on water
 quality, including boring under the Eel River, have been identified and are included in the Project
 design. To support the EIR, a delineation of wetlands and waters will be conducted to determine
 jurisdictional water features on the Project site.
- Land Use and Planning—The Project site is located within lands designated for agricultural and timber production by Humboldt County. The EIR will evaluate the proposed Project for consistency with existing local land use policies and regulations, including applicable habitat conservation plans, local coastal plans, and airport land use plans. No avoidance measures or permits have been identified at this time, but such measures may be included in the Project EIR.
- Mineral Resources—Humboldt County is one of 16 counties within California where the State Geologist has not classified the land based on the known or inferred mineral resource potential of that land, pursuant to the Surface Mining and Reclamation Act (SMARA) classifications. The location of some of the proposed wind turbines and the Gen-Tie would overlap some of the SMARA parcels. The EIR will identify and analyze impacts of the Project on mineral resources in Humboldt County. No avoidance measures or permits have been identified at this time, but such measures may be included in the Project EIR.
- Noise—The Project site lies in undeveloped area of the county where noise levels are very low, limited to noise from cattle grazing and occasional vehicles. The EIR will identify and analyze impacts of the Project on ambient noise levels, with emphasis on changes experienced by noise-sensitive receptors. No avoidance measures or permits have been identified at this time, but such measures may be included in the Project EIR.
- Population and Housing—The Project site lies in an unincorporated and largely undeveloped area
 of the county, and there is no housing on the Project site or in the immediate vicinity. The EIR will
 identify and analyze impacts of the Project on population and housing.
- Public Services—The Project site travels across land containing a High or Very High Fire hazard
 designation. The EIR will examine the potential for construction and operation to increase demands
 on local firefighters. The California Highway Patrol is responsible for enforcing traffic laws on
 roadways in unincorporated areas and on state highways throughout the county. The sheriff's office
 has mutual aid agreements with cities and the California Highway Patrol. The EIR will examine the
 potential for construction and operation to increase demands on law enforcement.
- Recreation—Humboldt Redwoods State Park, Grizzly Creek State Park, and Van Duzen County
 Park lie within 5 miles of the Project site. The EIR will identify and analyze impacts of the Project on
 recreational resources.

- Transportation and Traffic—The roadway network in the unincorporated parts of the county is primarily rural in character, serving small communities through a system of federal and state freeways and highways, county roads (including arterials, collectors, and local streets), and private roads. The EIR will identify and analyze impacts of the Project on the circulation system. No avoidance measures or permits have been identified at this time, but such measures may be included in the Project EIR.
- Utilities and Service Systems—The Project alignment is located on rural hillsides in an area that is
 not provided with municipal services such as potable-water delivery or wastewater systems. The EIR
 will identify and analyze impacts of the proposed Project on existing utility systems and services. No
 avoidance measures or permits have been identified at this time, but such measures may be included
 in the Project EIR.

BACKGROUND AND DISCUSSION

Linda Wise, General Manager for Recology Eel River, will be on hand to provide a presentation and answer any questions.

The City's Solid Waste, Organic Materials and Recycling Franchise Agreement became effective on January 1, 2017 and will continue through December 31, 2026. Rates were last adjusted on June 19, 2018 as part of an annual adjustment process tied to the consumer price index. During that meeting the Council was informed that changes in the global recycling market would likely lead Recology to propose changes to the franchise agreement in order to adjust to these new realities. In addition, language changes were needed to better align the current franchise agreement with the effort to coordinate regional recycling efforts.

The amendment will:

- As of October 1, 2018 the proposal would increase rates by approximately 3.3% due to increased recycling costs.
- Designate the Samoa Recovery Center as the designated Recycling Facility.
- Create a process to adjust recycling rates.

• Eliminate the payment to the City of \$10.00 per ton for recyclable materials collected within the City, forfeiting the City's right under the franchise agreement to receive revenue from recycling. Annual revenue is approximately \$1,500.

Recology has proposed these changes become effective on October 1, 2018. Therefore it is advised that the Council take action before that point in time.

FIRST AMENDMENT TO SOLID WASTE, ORGANIC MATERIALS AND RECYCLING FRANCHISE AGREEMENT

This First Amendment to Solid Waste, Organic Materials and Recycling Franchise Agreement (this "Amendment") is made and entered into as of August 21, 2018 by and between the City of Rio Dell ("City") and Recology Eel River (f/k/a Eel River Disposal Company, Inc.), a California corporation ("Contractor").

WHEREAS, City and Eel River Disposal Company, Inc. ("ERD") entered into a Solid Waste, Organic Materials and Recycling Franchise Agreement dated January 1, 2017 (the "Franchise Agreement");

WHEREAS, City is a party to a Memorandum of Understanding Between the Humboldt Waste Management Authority ("HWMA") and Its Member Agencies to Participate in a Recycling Processing and Marketing of Curbside Collected Recyclable Material Proposal dated February 8, 2018 (the "MOU");

WHEREAS, pursuant to the MOU, the HWMA entered into an Agreement for Recyclable Materials Processing and Marketing Services dated August 7, 2018 with Recology Eel River (the "Processing Agreement"), for the processing of Recyclable Materials collected within the HWMA Member Agencies' franchised areas at the Recology Eel River Samoa Resource Recovery Center (the "MRF");

WHEREAS, consistent with the MOU and the Processing Agreement, City and Contractor wish to amend the Franchise Agreement to (1) designate the MRF as the Designated Recycling Facility, (2) adjust rates under the Franchise Agreement to reflect the initial cost of processing at the MRF, as set forth in the Processing Agreement, and (3) provide a mechanism to adjust rates annually to reflect changes in the processing cost under the Processing Agreement.

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS AGREED as follows:

- 1. Effective as of October 1, 2018, Exhibits A, A-1, B, C and D of the Franchise Agreement are hereby amended to read in their entirety as Exhibits A (Disposal Rates), A-1 (Disposal Rates Per Ton), B (Collection Rates), C (Recyclables Processing Rates), and D (Combined Rates) attached to this Amendment, respectively. The Service Rates that Contractor is entitled to charge under the Franchise Agreement shall not exceed those set forth in such amended Exhibit D. Exhibit E of the Franchise Agreement is hereby deleted.
- 2. If, at the time this Amendment is entered into, CONTRACTOR has already billed customers under the previous Service Rates for the period beginning October 1, 2018, then, in a subsequent billing, CONTRACTOR may bill customers for the difference between such rates and the new rates, with respect to services provided from and after October 1, 2018.
- 3. The definition of "Designated Recycling Facility" in Section A (Definitions) is hereby amended to read in its entirety as follows:

"Designated Recycling Facility (or Recycling Facility): The facility or facilities appropriately permitted by the State of California and designated and approved by the CITY. As of September 6, 2018, the Designated Recycling Facility is the Recology Eel River Samoa Resource Recovery Center located at 55 Vance Avenue, Samoa, California."

4. Section 2.03.01 (Service Rates) is hereby amended to read in its entirety as follows:

"Service Rates: In consideration of the services provided hereunder, CONTRACTOR shall be entitled to charge customers for services at rates not exceeding the Service Rates set forth in Exhibit D hereto. Each Service Rate is the sum of three components: a disposal component, a collection component, and a recyclables processing component. The disposal, collection and recyclables processing components are set forth in Exhibits A, B and C, respectively, and shall be adjusted effective July 1 of each year as provided in Sections 2.03.03, 2.03.04 and 2.03.04.A, respectively."

- 5. Section 2.03.02 (Fees From Subscribers) is hereby amended to replace the words "Exhibit A," wherever they appear, with the words "Exhibit D."
- 6. A new Section 2.03.04.A is hereby added to the Franchise Agreement, which shall read in its entirety as follows:

"Adjustment of Recyclables Processing Component. The Recyclables Processing component of each Service Rate shall be adjusted by the percentage change in Processing Costs between the Rate Year and the Current Year. "Rate Year" means the 12-month period commencing on the July 1 Service Rate adjustment date. "Current Year" means the immediately preceding 12-month period. "Processing Costs" means (i) CONTRACTOR's reasonable good faith projection of the number of tons of recyclable materials to be delivered by CONTRACTOR to the Designated Recycling Facility under this Agreement for the period in question, multiplied by (ii) the per-ton fee payable by CONTRACTOR for processing at the Designated Recycling Facility for the period in question, as determined pursuant to the Agreement for Recyclable Materials Processing and Marketing Services dated August 7, 2018 between the Humboldt Waste Management Authority and Recology Eel River, as amended. CONTRACTOR's projection of recyclable materials tonnage for the Current Year shall use actual data for the months of the Current Year for which actual data are available"

7. The first sentence of Section 2.03.08 (Franchise Fee) is hereby amended to read in its entirety as follows:

"CONTRACTOR shall pay to CITY five percent (5%) of the gross service fee paid to it by Subscribers for the collection of solid and green waste."

8. Except as expressly set forth in this Amendment, the Franchise Agreement shall remain in full force and effect. Unless the context otherwise requires, all references in this Amendment to sections refer to sections of the Franchise Agreement.

China's Changing Policies on Imported Recyclables

April 2018

Overview

The Recycling industry has been very successful at providing environmental benefits including diverting material from landfills, conserving natural resources, and reducing greenhouse gas emissions by displacing the use of raw materials. This success was accomplished through the combined efforts of both the public and private industry to collect, sort, bale and market the recyclables to their end-markets.

For years, China has been the single largest consumer of recyclable materials generated in the United States. In 2016, approximately 41% of paper recovered in North America was exported with about a quarter of recyclable paper exported to Chinese mills. Similarly, over 20% of post-consumer bottles and 33% of non-bottle rigid plastics from the U.S. were exported in 2015. The European Union exports over 95% of its plastic to China, and the US and the EU are the largest exporters of recovered paper into China. China consumed over 50% of the world's recycled paper and plastic in 2016.

Over the past year, China has taken a number of steps, including establishing bans and imposing strict quality standards, to restrict recyclable materials imported into China. These measures are already having significant impacts on recycling within the U.S., and the rest of the world. Because so much material had previously been absorbed by China, this decision leaves much of the material without sufficient end markets.

It may be some time before alternative markets can be developed to fully replace China. In the meantime, recyclers are struggling to manage recyclables in a manner that maintains current programs at economically viable levels.

Background

- 1. In February, as part of China's broader "National Sword" campaign, customs enforcement began a one-year crack down on illegal smuggling of "foreign waste."
- 2. On July 18, 2017, China notified the World Trade Association (WTO) of its intent to ban 24 materials from being imported. These include post-consumer plastic and mixed paper effective January 1, 2018.

- 3. On November 15, 2017, the Chinese announced a new quality standard for material limiting prohibitive to 0.5 percent. This requirement applies to all paper and paperboard materials, even those that are not banned (such as ONP or OCC) effective March 1, 2018.
- 4. On March 6, 2018, the Chinese Government announced a special action campaign entitled "Blue Sky 2018" focused on the banned materials. This campaign is targeted at cracking down on smuggling of the banned materials.
- 5. The China Council for International Cooperation on Environment and Development (CCICED) released a paper stating that a further stop to material imports will be in place by 2019. This international advisory body that includes some top Chinese officials signals that recycling restrictions from China may become tighter, not looser in the future.

Impact to U.S. Recycling

Higher costs and lower revenues:

- Lower revenues due to depressed commodity prices. The loss of the Chinese export markets has disrupted recyclable markets leading to lower revenues as some materials must be sold at significantly lower prices, sometimes even negative. As a result, the overall revenues from the combined recycling stream is depressed.
- Higher processing costs. In order to meet the new quality standards, MRFs are slowing down the lines and adding sorters. Processing at some facilities has been changed from negative sorts to positive sorts resulting in more effort to produce less salable material. These measures are reducing throughput and driving processing costs higher.
- Higher transportation costs. Regulatory
 requirements, a booming economy and a tight labor
 market already contributed to increased domestic
 freight costs. However, as material is diverted to
 international ports outside of China, shipping costs are
 also increasing as the backhaul advantage dissipates.

- Higher capital costs. To meet the higher quality standards, some MRFs are also accelerating and increasing capital expenditures.
- Availability of outlets. The ability of other markets, both domestic and the remaining Asian export market, to absorb all the recyclables have been severely strained. Some materials have not been able to find an economically viable end market. With few markets available, incidents of stockpiling (or landfilling) material have been reported.
- Stockpiling issues. Due to storage capacity issues, stockpiling is not a viable option. Warehousing is also an issue due to availability of space and costs of facilities. In either case, processed bales can deteriorate over time which creates unacceptable safety hazards and unmarketable recycled product.
- Regional variations. The impact varies by region and local markets across the country.
- Development of new outlets. With time, new outlets for markets are expected to develop. The timeline of new market development, however, is uncertain due to its dependence on establishing new facilities and infrastructure.

Actions to take

- Ensure High Quality Recyclables High quality material is more likely to find a market. The new 0.5 percent prohibitives limit is far below any existing international standard. However, high quality material will be welcomed by both domestic and international markets. Focus on core recyclables to reduce contamination and avoid adding new products to the recyclable stream while trying to improve quality.
- Work with the entire industry. This is a global and an industry-wide issue, not a local or individual company issue. Our industry will benefit if we work together with city and state officials to develop solutions in the near term, and to work together for longer term solutions.
- Communicate. It is important to communicate with recycling partners to focus on quality and to develop solutions for your communities. See the communications strategy below for more suggestions.

- Review contracts. Recycling requirements may need to be amended through force majeure provisions as this is a global situation. In addition, both recyclers and municipalities should review contracting provisions to ensure fair and equitable contracts. NWRA and SWANA worked together to develop a Joint Advisory on Designing Contracts for Processing of Municipal Recyclables along with two attachments. These documents should be utilized to inform future contracts.
- Talk with regulators. States may need to approve temporarily suspensions of recycling requirements where there is no market.

Communications Strategy

- Develop a communication plan appropriate for your market area. Make sure to be transparent in messaging providing clear information about the severity of the issue but avoid overstating it. Convey the commitment to working with customers and regulators. Provide recommendations on what should be recycled and how to minimize contamination.
- Contact your state regulatory agency to ensure that they are aware of the issue. Ensure key stakeholders know that we have been working at the federal level. Be careful in communicating the serious ramifications of this issue, while recognizing that there is significant uncertainty.
- Consider engaging local industry groups to help with the messaging. Work with your state's industry associations to convey a single message to cities "from the industry."
- Communicate with transparency to your customers, and work to shore up the long-term benefits of recycling to reduce public backlash. Although the U.S. exports a significant amount of recyclables, domestic markets do exist and may expand, perhaps as a direct result of China's actions.
- This is a good time to develop and execute public education programs focused on quality. Recycling the right materials correctly will help minimize the negative impacts of the current market constrictions. Work with local governments to focus messaging around recycled paper, cardboard, bottles and cans, and how to reduce contamination at the curb.







Recommendation:

That the City Council:

- 1. Open the public hearing, receive staff's report regarding amending the Community Commercial (CC) and Neighborhood Center (NC) Regulations to allow residential uses on upper floors of mixed use buildings; and
- 2. Discuss, Deliberate and Make a Motion and a Second; and
- 3. Take Public Comment; and
- 4. Find that the proposed amendment has been processed in accordance with the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA); and
- 6. Adopt Ordinance No. 370-2018 amending the Community Commercial (CC) and Neighborhood Center Regulations to allow residential uses on upper floors of mixed use buildings.

Background

As reported at your meeting of August 7th staff is in the process of updating the City's Housing Element and discovered that Policy A-12 and Legislative Action Item A-2 encourages mixed use development in commercial zones and the necessary amendments to implement the Policy. The Town Center zone does allow residential uses on the upper floors of mixed use buildings. The Community Commercial (CC) and Neighborhood Center (NC) zones currently do not allow mixed uses.

Mixed use development has been encouraged by the State and used throughout the State to revitalize commercial districts. Council member Johnson, who will not be at the meeting, requested that staff inform the Council that both the Cities of Brea and San Jose have been completely revitalized by actually requiring mixed-use developments.

Your Council voted 4-1 at the meeting of August 7th to move the Ordinance forward to a second reading and adoption. Council member Strahan voted against the amendment, but gave no reason for her dissenting vote.

Zone Reclassification Required Finding:

1. The proposed amendment is consistent and compatible with the General Plan and any implementation programs that may be affected.

As indicated above, the Housing Element contains policies and action plans that actually require the City to update the Zoning Regulations to allow residential uses on upper floors of mixed use buildings. In addition, the Land Use Element actually identifies residential uses on upper floors of mixed use buildings as permitted uses. Therefore, the recommended amendments are consistent and compatible with the General Plan.

2. The proposed amendments have been processed in accordance with the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA).

The primary purpose of the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) is to inform the decision makers and the public of potential environmental effects of a proposed project.

Based on the nature of the project, staff has determined that the project is Statutorily Exempt pursuant to Section 15061(b) (3) of the CEQA Guidelines, Title 14, Chapter 3 of the California Code of Regulations. Pursuant to Section 15061(b) (3) of the CEQA Guidelines this exemption is covered by the general rule that CEQA applies only to projects which have the potential for causing a *significant* effect on the environment. Where it can be seen with certainty that there

is no possibility that the project in question may have a significant effect on the environment, the project is not subject to CEQA. Based on the nature of the proposed amendments, staff believes there is no evidence to suggest that the amendments will have a significant effect on the environment.

ORDINANCE NO. 370-2018



AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF RIO DELL AMENDING THE NEIGHBORHOOD CENTER (NC) AND COMMUNITY COMMERCIAL (CC) ZONES, SECTIONS 17.20.050 AND 17.20.060 OF THE RIO DELL MUNICIPAL CODE

WHEREAS staff is in the process of updating the City's Housing Element; and

WHEREAS the current Housing Element contains policies and action plans that require the City to update the Zoning Regulations to allow residential uses on upper floors of mixed use buildings; and

WHEREAS the Land Use Element currently identifies residential uses on upper floors of mixed use buildings as permitted uses in the Neighborhood Center (NC) and Community Commercial (CC) land use designations; and

WHEREAS the City Council finds that based on evidence on file and presented in the staff report that the proposed amendments are consistent and compatible with a comprehensive view of the General Plan and any implementation programs that may be affected; and

WHEREAS the City Council finds that based on evidence on file and presented in the staff report that the potential impacts of the proposed minor amendments have been assessed and have been determined not to be detrimental to the public health, safety, or welfare; and

WHEREAS the proposed amendments have been processed in accordance with the applicable provisions of the California Government Code and the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA); and

WHEREAS the City Council has determined that the proposed amendments are Statutorily Exempt pursuant to Section 15061(b) (3) of the CEQA Guidelines, Title 14, Chapter 3 of the California Code of Regulations.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the City Council of the City of Rio Dell:

- 1. Finds that the proposed amendments are in the public interest and consistent with an overall comprehensive view of the General Plan; and
- 2. Finds that based on evidence on file and presented in the staff report that the potential impacts of the proposed amendments have been assessed and have been determined not to be detrimental to the public health, safety, or welfare; and
- 3. Finds that based on the nature of the proposed amendments, the project is Statutorily Exempt pursuant to Section 15061(b) (3) of the CEQA Guidelines, Title 14, Chapter 3 of the California Code of Regulations. Pursuant to Section 15061(b) (3) of the CEQA Guidelines this exemption is covered by the general rule that CEQA applies only to projects which have the potential for causing a *significant* effect on the environment; and
- 4. Approves and adopt Ordinance No. 366-2018 amending the City's Flood Damage Prevention Regulations, Section 15.15 of the Rio Dell Municipal Code.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the City Council of the City of Rio Dell does hereby ordain as follows:

Section 1

Section 17.20.050 of the Rio Dell Municipal Code is hereby amended as follows:

17.20.050 Neighborhood Center or NC zone.

The neighborhood center or NC zone is intended to provide for small-scale shopping centers located within neighborhoods which will provide convenient sales and service facilities to residential areas, without detracting from the residential desirability of such areas. The following regulations shall apply in all neighborhood center or NC zones:

- (1) Principal Permitted Uses.
- (a) Social halls, fraternal and social organizations and clubs, plant nurseries and greenhouses;
- (b) Professional and business offices and commercial instruction;
- (c) Stores, agencies and services of a light commercial character, conducted entirely within an enclosed building, such as antique shops, art galleries, retail bakeries, banks, barber shops, beauty salons, bookstores, clothing and apparel stores, coin-operated dry cleaning and laundries, dry cleaning and laundry agencies, drug stores, florists, food markets, furniture

stores, hardware and appliance stores, radio and television sales and services, restaurants and licensed premises appurtenant thereto, automobile service stations and repair, studios, tailor shops, enclosed theaters, and variety stores;

- (d) Sales of used and secondhand goods, when appurtenant to any of the foregoing;
- (e) Pet shops, public garages, sales of used or secondhand goods, and storage warehouses;
- (f) Apartments on the upper floors of multistory buildings
- (2) Uses Permitted with a Use Permit.
- (a) Boarding and rooming houses, and bed and breakfast inns in a mixed use building;
- (b) Professional and business offices, health services, and commercial instruction when part of a mixed use building;
- (c) Small animal hospitals completely enclosed within a building;
- (d) Civic and cultural uses including City offices and day care centers;
- (e) Uses not specifically identified, but similar to and compatible with the uses permitted in the zone.

Section 2.

Section 17.20.060 of the Rio Dell Municipal Code is hereby amended as follows:

17.20.060 Community Commercial or CC zone.

The purpose of the community commercial or CC zone is to provide for large-scale commercial uses. The following regulations shall apply in all community commercial or CC zones:

- (1) Principal Permitted Uses.
- (a) Large-scale retail stores and retail services, including supermarkets;
- (b) Automotive sales, automotive services contained entirely within a building, and gas stations;
- (c) Light manufacturing contained entirely within a building;
- (d) All uses permitted with a use permit in neighborhood center or NC zones, without regard to the securing of any use permit, except as provided in subsection (2) of this section.

(e) Apartments on the upper floors of multistory buildings

- (2) Use Permitted with a Use Permit.
- (a) Motels in a lodging building or in a mixed use building, RV parks;
- (b) Small animal hospitals, completely enclosed within a building;
- (c) Stores, agencies and services such as carpentry and cabinet-making shops, clothing manufacture, contractors' yards, dry cleaning and laundry plants, handicraft manufacture, lumber yards, metalworking shops, wholesale outlet stores, painters' and decorators' yards, plumbing shops, printing and lithographic;
- (d) Civic and cultural uses including City offices and other government services and City parking facilities.
- (e) Uses not specifically identified, but similar to and compatible with the uses permitted in the zone.

Section 3. Severability

If any provision of the ordinance is invalidated by any court of competent jurisdiction, the remaining provisions shall not be affected and shall continue in full force and effect.

Section 4. Limitation of Actions

Any action to challenge the validity or legality of any provision of this ordinance on any grounds shall be brought by court action commenced within ninety (90) days of the date of adoption of this ordinance.

Section 5. CEQA Compliance

The City Council has determined that the adoption of this ordinance is exempt from review under the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA), subject to Section 15061(b)(3) of the CEQA Guidelines. Due to the nature of the proposed code revisions, there is no evidence that any significant impact to the environment would occur as a result of adoption of the Ordinance.

Section 6. Effective Date

This ordinance becomes effective thirty (30) days after the date of its approval and adoption.
